## "ANOTHER FORM OF WORLDLINESS"

Many of us pride ourselves on the fact that, "I don't gamble, drink, swear, dress immodestly, dance, ..." In other words, we are not "worldly". Or, are we? Can we be worldly without ever practicing some of these "worldly" habits?

The apostle Paul told Timothy that " ... the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows." (1 Timothy 6:10)
