THE BOOKS OF HISTORY

The kingdom divides and the captivity of God's people. **1 & 2 Chronicles**: The religious history of Israel, giving us additional information about the kings. **Ezra**: The account is given, by the scribe and priest Ezra, of their return from Babylonian captivity. **Nehemiah**: The king's cupbearer who returned to Jerusalem to build the gates and walls of the city. **Esther**: A great woman of courage who saved her people from destruction by her faith and commitment to God. This woman was faithful against great odds.

One can learn much about the people who lived in those days. The people of God made many mistakes along the way causing them great discomfort and ultimate rejection by God. He was longsuffering trying to get them to see the advantage of remaining faithful unto Him. Sadly, many are not learning from the lessons of bygone days and will repeat them. Will we? ***
