CAN WE WAIT TOO LONG?

Whenever the subject of correcting children comes up, many different attitudes and concepts are expressed. Still, I'm convinced God's ways are the best.

Many times parents have expressed the doubts they have of being "too hard" on their children. So called "how to raise your children books", tell us not to discipline the child until they are at least five. What does God say?

So the sons of Levi did according to the word of Moses. And about three thousand men of the people fell that day." (Exodus 32:27,28)

The willingness to apply the "remedy" displays true love! What if God had permitted it to go on without any consequences? No love would have been displayed, and no lessons would have been learned.

"Remember now your Creator in the days of your youth, before the difficult days come, And the years draw near when you say, "I have no pleasure in them": (Ecclesiastes 12:1)

"Train up a child in the way he should go, And when he is old he will not depart from, it." (Proverbs 22:6)

"And you, fathers, do not provoke your children to wrath, but bring them up in the training and admonition of the Lord." (Ephesians 6:4)

Discipline administered with love does work! "Now no chastening seems to be joyful for the present, but painful; nevertheless, afterward it yields the peaceable fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it."
